Welcome to this issue of your Contact community newspaper.



Financial Update

Like all Councils across the Country, local authorities are now feeling the strain more than ever with the continued budget cuts from Central Government.

On 9th October, Merthyr Tydfil CBC received its provisional Welsh Local Government Settlement for 2019/20 of +0.33%. Whilst this was an increase to last year's settlement, this still leaves Merthyr Tydfil CBC with a budget shortfall for the next 3 years of approximately £5.6m for 2019/20, £13,850m for 2020/21 and £17m for 2021/22.

As a local Council, our elected members have a statutory duty to set a balanced budget at the end of each financial year. This however, is getting more and more difficult especially with the continued social care obligations exhausting local authority budgets. The pattern of growing overspends on services and dwindling reserves exhibited by an increasing number of authorities is not sustainable long term.

This Council has been working hard to identify a range of options to save money. These have included a recruitment freeze, restriction on expenditure and the continued scrutiny of service area budgets. In an attempt to reduce the number of compulsory redundancies, the Council has also offered a voluntary Redundancy/ Voluntary Early Retirement package for Council employees who may wish to leave the organisation via this route.

As part of the proposals to save money, consideration will also be given to the setting of the Council Tax for 2019/20. Some Councils across Wales have already indicated an increase to Council Tax in order to stay afloat. We must also consider this if we are to continue to deliver some of our services.

We will continue to engage with all stakeholders to look at how we can deliver services more efficiently and effectively. We are doing everything we can to protect those services provided to those most vulnerable within our communities but this is becoming more and more challenging as times does on.

The long term financial plan for Councils is still unknown. In the meantime, we will continue to focus on our priorities and develop new ways of working to deliver services the best we can for the residents of our County Borough.

RECYCLE THIS CHRISTMAS

Conventional wrapping paper isn't recyclable because it contains glitter and ribbons, so please try to use brown paper to wrap presents - it's much cheaper and can be recycled afterwards in the paper recycling box! If you generate any non-recyclable wrapping paper, please take this to the household waste and recycling centre.

FOOD WASTE

All types of cooked and uncooked food which is free of packaging should be placed into compostable bags and into your food waste bin. Food waste is collected weekly.

Electrical items are harmful to the environment and should never be placed in the wheeled bin as they need to be broken down and disposed of correctly. The Council collect small electrical items at the kerbside and larger items can be taken to the HWRC sites. You can book a chargeable bulky waste collection by

Both sites are open 9.30am - 4.30pm seven days a week all year round, except 25th December and 1st January. Please remember:

All waste must be separated by type and placed in the correct container.

- Packaging must be removed from cardboard before placing it into the correct skip.
- Bags containing mixed waste will need to be sorted at home before being brought to the site. Sorting stations are available at the sites, which you will be directed to in order to sort any mixed materials.
- You should flatten cardboard before taking them to the sites. Always ask a member of staff if you're unsure which skip to deposit your materials into.

Storm Callum leaves its mark on Merthyr Tydfil

As you are no doubt aware Storm Callum which hit the UK in October. had a big impact on some of the roads in Merthyr Tydfil.

Below is an update on road closures and works currently taking place. Dowlais High Street: During Water excavation works Welsh have discovered further issues with collapsed combined sewer

main therefore it is anticipated that the High Street will be closed until January 2019. Due to vehicles speeding in the area which is causing a risk to Welsh Water operatives and the public, the extent of the road closure will be increased to include the junction at Market Street leading on to the High Street. Full access will remain

to OP Chocolates and the Engine House.

Ffynnon Dwyn: Following the landslide at Ffynon Dwyn, work has started to construct a 5m high retaining wall to support the highway with associated drainage work. It is anticipated that the highway will be re-opened by 14th December.

Pontsticill: Works to address the landslide at Pontsarn are far more complex due to the poor ground conditions and the potential for a further landslide. A drill rig is currently onsite carrying out boreholes and extracting soil samples to supplement a detailed ground investigation. Following this an appropriate method of slope

stabilisation will be designed. It is anticipated that the closure of the stretch of road between Pontsarn and Pontsticill (near the Spanish house) will be in place until the end of February 2019, however we will post further updates to our social media account as and when they are available.

Jobs project finds bulk of staff for newest pub

Staff at Merthyr Tydfil's newest pub were almost all recruited through a County Borough Council-run project to get help get long-term unemployed people back into work.

A total of 10 bar staff were taken on at The Iron Dragon after joining the local authority's Communities for Work (C4W) and Communities for Work Plus programmes.

People signing up to the Welsh Government initiative are assigned project mentors who help them access training, volunteering opportunities and work clubs.

"Implementing the principles of the Merthyr Tydfil Economic Growth Partnership, our officers co-ordinated the recruitment process using a one point of contact for the employer and potential employees," said Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Public Protection Cllr Geraint Thomas. "This support helped the bar managers' transition to the town and also allowed Iron Dragon owners Amber Taverns to focus on being ready and open for business."

Charlotte Holding, 33, had been out of work for six years since living in her native Essex. She went to the local Job Centre Plus, who put her in touch with Communities for Work Merthyr Tydfil. After receiving one to one support – advice, guidance and training – she was interviewed for the job and working there within two weeks.

"I'd done bar work before and I love it here," she said. "The customers are a diverse mix of characters and great fun. I'm very grateful to the C4W officers for all their support in finding the job and providing training."

Landlady Donna Molloy said she and husband Dave would have found it much tougher to employ staff without C4W. "We'd have had a lot of work to do it all on our own. C4W promoted the vacancies, sifted through all the applications and arranged the interviews.

"All the staff we've taken on through C4W have done really well, considering they came to us with no previous experience – we had a manic opening week and have been busy ever since!"

'Crucible' plans progress

Plans to transform the Cyfarthfa area into a heritage centre of international significance have taken a step forward with a proposal to set up a working group to progress ideas and develop a fundraising strategy. A report, The Crucible, published earlier this year by the Design Commission for Wales called for an investment of at least £50m over the next decade to develop a modern interpretive centre that would 'showcase Merthyr Tydfil's standing as the world's largest centre of iron production in the 18th and 19th centuries'. The report was the result of a 'charrette' - a 'visioning exercise' bringing together architects, landscape architects, planners, museum and heritage specialists and artists, as well as local community groups

– to appraise Cyfarthfa's regeneration potential.

The Council has now agreed to establish the working group, one of the aims of which will be to explore forming links with major London based charities, trusts, Welsh Government departments, and all relevant UK based funding organisations. A total £1,320,000 has already been secured through the Council's Capital Programme between 2018/19 and 2021/22 to use as matchfunding against any funding applications.

"Much of Merthyr's physical heritage has been lost or hidden, but over the last 30 years there has been a greater consciousness of the importance of conserving what remains," said Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Public Protection Cllr Geraint Thomas.

"The central proposition in *The Crucible* is the need to create at Cyfarthfa a visitor experience of a scale and quality that would mark it out as a major national landmark with international appeal, befitting the town's central contribution to the industrial revolution," said Cllr Thomas.

"Properly connected to other key sites, through imaginative physical and online signposting, the effects of such a development would be felt over time across the rest of the town and the region."

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School transport consultation ends in February

You have until 4 February 2019 to give us your thoughts on plans to change the current home to school transport provision for students.

We are consulting on potential changes following a review that identified children are being transported to schools outside Merthyr Tydfil when suitable schools are available within the County Borough.

At present, it costs the Authority more than £162,000 a year to transport pupils to schools outside the County Borough, excluding the Welsh medium school Ysgol Gyfun Rhydywaun.

"The current provision doesn't align with the school admissions policy, which means Merthyr Tydfil students are travelling to schools outside the County Borough when suitable schools are available within it," said Cabinet Member for Learning Cllr Lisa Mytton.

Pupils are currently transported to the following schools outside the County Borough: Ysgol Gyfun Rhydywaun, Lewis School Pengam, Lewis Girls' Comprehensive School, Ysgol Gyfun Cwm Rhymni, St John's Baptist Church in Wales School, Cardinal Newman Roman Catholic School and St Michael's Roman Catholic Primary School.

A number of options are being considered for the future of the service. These are:

- Remain as is there is no change to the existing arrangements. Pupils will continue to be transported to their 'nearest suitable' school in terms of distance, providing it is more than two miles (primary) or three miles (secondary) away from home.
- Providing free transport for pupils attending schools within Merthyr Tydfil County Borough only, and to Ysgol Gyfun Rhydywaun as a Welsh language provider and St John's Baptist Church in Wales School as a faith provider.
- 3. Providing free transport for children attending schools within Merthyr Tydfil County Borough only, along with Ysgol Gyfun Rhydywaun as a Welsh language provider.

Housing First launched

A new approach to addressing rough sleeping that has been successful in the United States and parts of Europe and the UK has been launched in Merthyr Tydfil.

Run in partnership with The Salvation Army, the Merthyr Tydfil Housing First Project will see some rough sleepers who want to be part of the project being moved from the streets directly into their own home, with no homeless shelters in between.

The idea is that a homeless person – who often has a range of other issues – will be given independent accommodation while focusing on addressing other issues like substance misuse or poor mental health. The accommodation is separate from the support.

The project was launched at the Merthyr Tydfil Homelessness Summit, which saw members and officers from the Council, agencies, charities and volunteers from the Merthyr Tydfil Night Shelter meet at the Orbit Business Centre to discuss the plans.

"The idea of Housing First is simple – it's housing with no strings attached. Then come the support services to help meet people's needs," said Cabinet Member for Regeneration and Public Protection Cllr Geraint Thomas.

"The approach has been adopted in different ways in different countries, achieving mostly encouraging results. I'm pleased that we are trialling it in Merthyr Tydfil and very hopeful of it being a significant step forward in solving the problems of homelessness," he added.

"The homelessness summit was thought-provoking and presented a great opportunity for individuals and agencies to provide their views on the changes and improvements needed locally to help improve our collective response to rising homelessness."

Winter Weather Information



Winter weather of snow and ice can cause disruption to services, transport and affect access to communities within Merthyr Tydfil.

The Highways Department has drawn up a Winter Maintenance Plan which covers Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council's response to winter weather, specifically low temperatures and heavy snowfall.

The aim of the plan is to facilitate and coordinate Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council's assistance to communities during winter weather.

How do we decide when to treat the roads?

This winter could be the coldest in five years, according to weather forecasters. When roads are icy and covered by snow, naturally residents ask what is being done to clear the roads and footpaths.

Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council as the Highway Authority is responsible for providing a winter maintenance service. This enables us to assist the travelling public to use the County Borough road network with reasonable safety throughout adverse winter weather. Our aim is to maintain or reinstate as quickly as possible, the traffic flow on all routes during the winter period and to ensure that vehicles and pedestrians can use them with safety.

Between 1st November and 31st March daily weather forecasts will be received from the Weather Forecast provider. These are analysed very carefully and a decision is made on what action is required on that day.

Where the forecast does not give a clear indication of ice or snow the Council can call upon a number of road sensors around the County Borough, which can give up to the minute information on the surface temperature of the road.

When we grit?

Gritting usually takes place overnight during snow or icy road conditions. The gritting routes will be treated as a precaution and we will re-treat the area if snow or ice is still present after precautionary treatment.

We will carry out a precautionary treatment if either snow has been forecast, or if freezing conditions occur immediately following rain.

If snow levels build up, snow ploughs will be used.

If you notice a grit bin that needs filling, please use our online form on our website to request a refill.

Clear snow from a road, path or cycleway

You can clear snow and ice from pavements yourself. It's unlikely that you'll be sued or held responsible if someone is injured on a path or pavement if you've cleared it carefully.

How to clear snow and ice When you clear snow and ice:

- do it early in the day it's easier to move fresh, loose snow
- don't use water it might refreeze and turn to black ice
- use salt if possible it will melt the ice or snow and stop it from refreezing overnight (but don't use the salt from salting bins as this is used to keep roads clear) you can use ash and sand if you don't have enough salt - it will provide grip underfoot
- pay extra attention when clearing steps and steep pathways - using more salt may

help.

Check on your neighbours

Older people, those with longterm health conditions, pregnant women and young children are more at risk in cold weather. If you know or look after someone who may be particularly susceptible to the effects of very cold weather, please help them stay warm and well.

- Make sure they're warm enough, especially at night.
- Top up stocks of food and medicines so they don't need to go out during very cold weather.
- If they start to feel unwell, even if it's a cough or cold, don't wait until it gets more serious. Seek advice from your pharmacist or your local GP surgery.
- If you're worried about an older person, contact a family member, or Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council's Adult Social Care on 01443 425011.

We as a Cabinet have been fortunate enough to play a part in developing some great projects and initiatives within our communities which has improved the lives of those living and working in our County Borough. Our commitment to you is that we will continue to do the best we can for the people of our County Borough making Merthyr Tydfil, a place to be proud of! Here are some of our highlights of 2018



We kicked off the year with our annual Budget Consultation roadshow, where we were out and about asking residents to help inform our 2018/19 budget. This was the first time for our administration to do this specific consultation and it was great to get out there and hear the views of the public.

Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council's 'Meanwhile' programme, which started in 2015, is also helping turn one of the most historical parts of the centre – Pontmorlais - into a haven of unique independent shops. The latest four businesses to open include Twin Taff Brewery, the brainchild of twin brothers Darryl and Daniel Williams, whose garden shed hobby has blossomed into Merthyr Tydfil's first town centre specialist microbrewery, based in Star Yard, Court Street.



Support and respite group for adults with learning difficulties Ymlaen (Welsh for 'the way forward') received a boost from a grants scheme aimed at helping Merthyr Tydfil people enjoy a healthier and better quality of life. 


MINI-MUSICIANS MAKING Merthyr College trumpet student THEIR MARK

WHO SHOULD HAVE THE VACCINE?

Anyone aged 65 or over.

 6 months to 65 years if in an 'at risk' group such as Diabetes, Asthma, COPD,

Heart Condition, Chronic Liver Disease, Body Mass Index (BMI) of 40 or more (adults only), a previous Stroke, Immune System that isn't working.

There are many more conditions that should have the vaccine, speak to your GP or Practice Nurse if you are unsure.

It is also recommended for people who are

- Pregnant
- Living in a long stay care home/residential homes
- Carers
- Community first responders
- Members of recognised voluntary organisations who provide planned emergency first aid at organised public events
- Health and Social Care staff delivering patient care
- Children aged 2 to 11 years (School Year 6)

WHEN TO GET VACCINATED?

The best time to have a flu vaccine is before flu starts to circulate which is usually mid-December at the earliest. **New for 2018, the recommended flu vaccines for children and those aged over 65 will be delivered in stages between September and November.** GP practices will offer vaccination as soon as possible, but delivery will be staggered so some people may be asked to wait until the recommended vaccine for them is available. Please be patient during this period.

DID YOU KNOW?

- You need the flu vaccine every year as the virus constantly changes
- Some people are more likely to be very ill with flu than others
- As we get older our immune system doesn't work as well, so older people are more at risk of catching flu
- Having the vaccine not only protects you but also those around you. This is especially important if you have someone in your family who is pregnant, or has a long term illness, or you have contact with young children or people more at risk of infection due to illness
- If you are not in any of the 'at risk' groups you can still obtain the vaccine from your pharmacy for a cost of around £10

NEW FOR 2018/19 SEASON: ANYONE AGED 65 OR OVER SHOULD HAVE A DIFFERENT INJECTABLE FLU VACCINE, DESIGNED TO WORK BETTER IN OLDER PEOPLE. IT IS KNOWN AS ATIV AND IS THE BEST FLU VACCINE FOR THIS AGE GROUP.

WHERE WILL CHILDREN BE VACCINATED?

- 2 year olds should attend GP practices for vaccination.
- 3 year olds that attend local authority nurseries will be vaccinated in schools. 3 year olds not in local authority nurseries should attend their GP.
- New for 2018, all reception and primary school children will have the vaccine in school up to year 6.
- The school programme will be delivered between October and December. School dates will soon be available online at cwmtaf.wales.
