INTRODUCTION

The Supporting People programme offers housing-related support to vulnerable people to help them to live in the community and enjoy greater independence. It helps to ensure that people can live in a decent home and to work alongside a support worker to improve their quality of life.

Supporting People is a government programme which started in 2003. It works through a partnership of local government, service users, support agencies and other partners both statutory and voluntary.

Supporting People is the overall responsibility of the Supporting People Planning Group (SPPG) which is concerned with the planning, funding and monitoring of housing related support services. It aims to improve the quality and effectiveness of support services at a local level and it publishes an annual Local Commissioning Plan (LCP) which sets out its priorities for the next three years. The programme is operated by the Supported Accommodation Services team that sits within Adult Social Care.

Supporting People Services may be provided to people in their own homes, sheltered housing or more specialised accommodation such as hostels, group homes or extra care. Although Supporting People only provides housing-related support, this service can be one part of a package that includes, for example, personal or medical care according to the needs of the individual.

The Supporting People programme has experienced a number of changes since the introduction of the new guidance in June 2013. Within Merthyr Tydfil, the supporting people planning group is committed to constructively embracing the new regional structure of the programme

In order to achieve this, the Supporting People Planning Group actively engages with the Cwm Taf Regional Collaborative Committee in all instances to facilitate the local and regional delivery of the programme. The following Local Commissioning Plan outlines the commissioning intentions of the Merthyr Tydfil Supporting People Planning Group.

PART ONE: STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

A) INTRODUCTION

The aims for the Supporting People Partnership stated in our previous Plan were

- 1. To complete the work of distributing SP resources over the period 2016-2019 including exploring options for disinvestment in existing schemes and investment in new ones.**
- 2. To continue to implement the new regional structure introduced following the review of Supporting People and its recommendations.**
- 3. To implement efficiency savings through the use of best practice across Supporting People and exploring and identifying regional commissioning opportunities**

In determining these Aims, the SPPG has made reference to:

- LCP
- Single Access Point (SAP) Data
- Homelessness And Vulnerable Groups Health Action Plan(HAVGHAP) needs data
- Housing Needs Group priorities
- Current service/funding distribution data
- MTCBC strategic plans
- Revised Supporting People guidance

To achieve Aim 1 we:

- Supported relevant agencies to participate fully in the Needs Mapping process
- Recorded and monitored numbers of referrals received per client group and per agency
- Maintained information about existing service capacity and occupancy
- Shared information with key strategic and operational groups
- Incorporated needs data from other sources into strategic planning of services including Housing Priorities

In pursuit of this goal:

a) The Supporting People Team has:

- Undertaken a programme of audit and evaluation on the hourly contracts
- provided needs data to strategic partners
- worked with SPPG and partners in RCT to develop and improve policy and procedure in relation to information sharing and allowable activities
- sought to ensure that service development decisions are consistent with agreed priorities and in line with needs data in compliance with Supporting People Programme Guidance through the completion of a Supporting People Project Plan which identifies areas for further scrutiny and assessment of strategic relevance

b) The Supporting People Planning Group has:

- Funded two new schemes, decommissioned two and reconfigured two schemes in line with identified needs in the last LCP

Specific priorities are in development based on need evidenced through a variety of sources. Specific details of services to take forward the above investment / disinvestment priorities are detailed in part five of this commissioning plan

To achieve Aim 2:

a) The Supporting People Planning Group has:

- Fully embraced the Regional Collaborative Committee and its function.
- Supported regionalisation of processes in particular regional allowable activities documentation

b) The Supporting People Team has:

- Hosted the regional worker for the Regional Collaborative Committee.
- Developed and maintained local service provider and landlord fora to feed into both the local Partnership and the Regional Collaborative Committee.
- Supported regionalisation of processes in particular regional information sharing agreements

To achieve Aim 3:

a) The Supporting People Planning Group has:

- Agreed the implementation of a Pricing Policy

- Supported regionalisation through the Cwm Taf Allowable activities document and the Pricing Policy
- Supported in principal further regional projects to meet homelessness need across the region

b) The Supporting People Team has:

- Developed an implementation Supporting People project plan to support the strategic relevance review of all SP funded services
- Worked in partnership with the reviewing officer to evaluate implementation of hourly rates and allowable activities
- Continued with the regional meeting to identify regional commissioning opportunities and share good practice
- Liaised with Supporting People teams Nationally to implement good practice including the Pricing policy

B) PRIMARY AIMS FOR THE SUPPORTING PEOPLE PARTNERSHIP 2017-20

The SPPG has agreed the following Primary Aims for the year 2017-20:

- **To evaluate the strategic relevance of the current spend to ensure funding is allocated appropriately over the period 2017-20**
- **To actively support regionalisation by continuing to implement regional structures wherever possible including the identification of joint contracting possibilities across the region and tackling poverty programmes**
- **To safeguard services by implementing efficiency savings through the use of best practice across Supporting People and wherever possible aligning practice across the region**

In determining these Aims, the SPPG has made reference to:

- LCP
- SAP Data
- Current service/funding distribution data
- MTCBC Strategic Plans.
- RCTCBC Strategic Plans
- Needs data from other sources including the Housing Regional needs information for Supporting People Teams

To achieve these aims we will:

- Work with providers to identify opportunities for reconfiguration and efficiency savings
- Work with regional providers to identify opportunities for regional working
- Explore possibilities for regional commissioning in line with the recognised need
- Implement efficiency programmes including the Pricing Policy
- Continue to evaluate schemes to ensure compliance with Supporting People Grant conditions on eligibility
- Continue to improve monitoring across services to ensure good quality and value for money and positive outcomes for service users
- Support relevant agencies to participate fully in the Needs Mapping Process
- Record and monitor numbers of referrals received per client group and per agency
- Maintain information about existing service capacity and occupancy whilst working with existing local providers to identify voids and mitigation strategies
- Develop up to date waiting lists and access to support and accommodation pathways to assist with void management and the ability of the local authority to meet its strategic duties
- Share information with key strategic and operational groups
- Fully embrace the Regional Collaborative Committee and its function.
- Continue to develop sub groups to progress the work of the RCC
- Support the implementation of regional projects
- Link to Regional Provider fora to discuss issues and identify and respond to concerns
- Develop and maintain off the shelf registers to commission slippage schemes effectively to meet need
- Utilise a number of needs sources when analysing the level of service required in the region including homelessness statistics and population needs assessment information
- Form closer links to the tackling poverty and early intervention and preventative agenda
- Reconfigure services to better meet needs

C) Regional Collaborative Committee (RCC) Priorities

The Cwm Taf RCC priorities for 2017/18 were identified in the RCC planning session held in October 2016 and are outlined below:

- To Identify where services can be commissioned regionally across Cwm Taf
- To Review current Floating Support provision to identify;
 - Where providers can be regionally commissioned
 - Where services can be re tendered/commissioned
- To continue to implement the Cost Calculator in Merthyr Tydfil and as a pilot in RCT to rationalise the spend

- Improve outcome monitoring across both SP teams and Cwm Taf providers to ensure SP services are able to effectively evidence quality services
- Form closer links to the tackling poverty and early intervention and preventative agenda in particular by exploring joint commissioning opportunities and reducing duplication by streamlining services where possible
- To monitor the implications of welfare benefit reform on the Supporting People programme including changes to Housing Benefit.
- To progress and action plan for the RCC with key milestones to focus work streams.

D) Service Provider priorities

Consultation was undertaken with regional providers through the regional provider's forum in November 2016. Overall participants felt there were no objections to either the general direction, content or the proposed regional priorities.

Some comments were passed about the needs data not being an accurate reflection (underestimating) of the range and complexity of needs presented but it was accepted that this followed from how the forms are completed rather than a collation error.

Overall there was agreement that data collection was reasonably competent in justifying existing service provision, but concerns were expressed that it is not geared up to collect data on new and emerging needs for which services do not yet exist.

The following 2 new regional priorities were agreed:

- 1) Prioritise service user participation and co-production across the Region.
- 2) Verify the validity and integrity of the needs data by comparing with the data collated for the Well-being of Future Generations Act 2015 and tackling poverty agenda, particularly on new and emerging needs..

PART TWO: NEEDS MAPPING

SUMMARY OF NEEDS ASSESSMENT

Information contributing to the Needs Assessments has been derived from various sources using different methods.

1. Individual Needs Assessment Mapping.

Individual Supported Housing Needs are registered via the SAP central referral system and analysed by the Supporting People Team. 583 referrals were received over the period 1st of April 2015- 31st of March 2016. Of these referrals 297 were female and 286 were male..

2. Strategic Planning Framework

The Local Commissioning Plan has considered the priorities outlined by our partners in Housing and Health. Supporting people providers have worked collaboratively in the population needs assessment process and have contributed to the engagement activities.

We are working in partnership with colleagues across the Local Authority to establish effective strategic groups to identify need and work collaboratively to address housing related support issues across the Local Authority. We are actively engaged with the Regional Provider Forum and the Regional Collaborative Committee to respond to provider and landlord concerns and have developed a local provider forum to consult on any changes.

We have undertaken consultation events with providers on the priorities to be outlined within the LCP and the Regional Commissioning Plan. We met with providers to discuss the outcomes submissions and have established a joint SP and homelessness forum

3. Research, Strategies, Policy Documents and legislative changes

a) Service Evaluations

A number of service evaluations have been conducted during 2016. These include a full evaluation of mental health services, ex-offender services and generic services alongside a light touch review of Learning Disability Services. These evaluations have assisted in the implementation of the Supporting People project plan and have identified potential efficiencies moving forward.

b) Welfare reform

The Supporting People Planning Group has received regular updates on the changes to the Welfare Benefit systems. Information from relevant departments has also been presented to the Supporting People Planning Group. The group is also seeking further information on the impact of any changes to eligible housing benefit for young people and supported accommodation settings.

c) The Social Services and Well Being Act & Wellbeing of Future Generations Act

Supporting People providers have been actively engaged in the Population needs assessment for the Social Services and Wellbeing Act and the Wellbeing of Future Generations Act . They have been consulted through the engagement work stream and have completed and submitted information on unmet need to support the data sub group of the needs assessment. Supporting People services will continue to contribute towards the preventative elements of the Acts through their ability to assist with maintaining independence in the community.

d) Housing Wales Act

The Supporting People team is working collaboratively with partners in the Housing department on a gateway into services. It is envisaged that this gateway will provide a means to appropriately refer into homelessness provision and meet the duties of the Act more effectively.

e) Tackling Poverty Agenda

The Supporting People team is working proactively to further align with the tackling poverty agenda. This has been supported by the establishment of joint SP, housing and MIA team meetings and the exploration of joint contracting opportunities with children's services and families first.
