School Attendance Matters!



As a parent you are legally responsible for making sure that your child attends school. If your child fails to attend school without an acceptable reason you risk getting a Fixed Penalty Notice or being prosecuted.

Improving educational outcomes for our children and young people is a key priority for the Local Authority. The links between poor attendance and attainment are compelling and the Local Authority is aiming to address the root cause of non-attendance, one of these being, 'safeguarding and long-term absence'.

'Persistent failure to send children to school is a clear sign of neglect'.

Arranging appointments and outings after school hours, at weekends or during school holidays will help to prevent disruption to your child's education and to the school. You should not expect the school to agree to your child going on holiday during term time and if you do take them out of school this too may result in a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Since 2014 the Education Welfare Service has had the authority to issue fixed penalty notice and fines for parents whose children have five days or more of unauthorised absence. The notice can

be issued for any absences not authorised by the school, including holidays. The EWS can issue these notices when concerns are raised by school or the police.
